

## Conquest Montezuma Cortes And The Fall Of Old Mexico Hugh Thomas

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During his march to the Aztec capital, Cortés gathers valuable allies among enemies of Montezuma. 8 August 1519: Beginning of the march to Tenochtitlan. Having skirmished their way along the coast, and met with Montezuma's emissaries, Cortés and the conquistadors set out for Tenochtitlan from their settlement of Vera Cruz.

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Cortes and Montezuma meet In November 1519, Cortes and his forces - 500 soldiers and 1000 Tlaxcaltec allies - entered

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Tenochtitlan, after being welcomed and formally received by Emperor Montezuma II. Cortez and La Malinche meet Moctezuma II. (Nov. 8, 1519).

In 1519 Spanish conquistador (explorer-conqueror) Hernán Cortés landed an expeditionary force of some 500 soldiers and 100 sailors at Potonchan, located on the Yucatán Peninsula of what is now Mexico. The Spanish had previously sent expeditionary forces to explore the region, but they were unaware of the extent of the Aztec empire.

The first conquest was, perhaps, the most successful. In 1519 Hernán Cortés conquered the Aztec Empire in a rapid, two-year, campaign. After launching from Cuba, taking with him 500 men (including slaves) and 13 horses.

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
